

As I wrap up my first year as Executive Director of Grounded Strategies, I am filled with deep gratitude for the opportunity to lead an organization with such a rich history, a powerful mission, and an unwavering commitment to equity.

Stepping into this role in 2024, I was immediately struck by the depth of Grounded's relationships and the trust it has earned over many years of showing up alongside community members. The work Grounded does—reclaiming vacant land, supporting neighborhood leadership, and building capacity with and in communities working to overcome a legacy of disinvestment—is transformative. Thank you to every steward, partner, supporter, and staff member who makes this work possible. I am honored to lead this work with Grounded and our community partners, and I'm looking forward to what's next.

COMMUNITY CARE

The Grounded CommunityCare Program works to inspire and support cohorts of residents to care for vacant lots and urban greenspace. Program participants, or 'stewards', receive tools and training to develop local capacity and opportunities to expand social, civic, and professional networks. Stewards report their care and beautification activities to Grounded's Resident Resources Manager and are compensated for their time on an hourly basis.

CommunityCare stewards take care of vacant land for various reasons. Some want to eliminate litter, some have public health concerns, and others want to beautify their community. Regardless of personal reasons for taking action, all stewards take pride in their work. Proactive vacant land maintenance impacts us all.

In 2024, Grounded operated CommunityCare with residents from the following communities involved: the Hill District, Larimer, Homewood, Wilkinsburg. We hosted workdays to maintain specific past project sites in the Hill District, thanks to generous funding from McAuley Ministries.

In December we celebrated CommunityCare Stewards and volunteers with a festive gathering to show our appreciation for their dedication to Grounded's mission. During the celebration, several Stewards talked about how long they have been connected to Grounded and their dedication to reclaiming and maintaining vacant land in their communities.



LOTS OF WILDFLOWERS

Lots of Wildflowers intends to beautify communities while exploring wildflower meadow and shrub/tree border plantings on urban vacant lots. This project entered its 5th year in 2024 and expanded to Braddock, North Braddock, and East Pittsburgh, commonly abbreviated as BEN.

A group of 10 residents from BEN participated in a six-month conservation program. From May to October, they attended monthly sessions on water conservation, biodiversity, and land recycling. They also joined two workdays in August and October.

Two community meetings in June and July gathered input from 25 attendees on project plans and site selection.

In August, a 13-foot-radius plot at 728 Braddock Avenue was covered for two months to prepare the soil. In October, the group planted 5 pounds of native wildflower and grass seeds mixed with biochar. A 3x26-foot mulch pathway was added, creating a 450 sq. ft. micro meadow to support pollinators.

Additionally, 10 lbs. of crimson clover and winter rye were planted on a nearby lot to restore compacted soil. The Penn State University Extension donated the seeds as part of their conservation education efforts.

In October, we began planting the initial seeds at a new meadow in Braddock. We also worked on a path that will bisect the circular meadow and connect an existing dog park. Our summer AmeriCorps intern, Claire, worked with Braddock residents to brainstorm site designs. Comprehensive site design work with residents is continuing into 2025.



PGH MOBILE TOOLBOX

When it comes to community projects, we find that there is often a lot of motivation, resources for events, and partnerships with service providing organizations. However, there is a shortage of tools available to communities to sustain the care taking and stewardship of their green projects.

The PGH Mobile Toolbox provides tools to keep green space in Allegheny County vibrant and maintained. Grounded provides these tools at no cost to non-profit organizations, public schools, volunteer groups, and other groups that do not profit from this work. It is provided at cost to folks who wish to utilize these tools for private gardens, private schools or land inaccessible to the public. This cost goes towards fuel and keeping the tools in tip-top shape for everyone!



Although 2024 was a slower season for the PGH Mobile Toolbox due to a challenging year, it still supported 180 volunteer hours across community workdays. Looking ahead, 2025 is already shaping up to be a busy and exciting season, with the toolbox available a month earlier – launching in April instead of May.



VACANT LAND ADVOCACY NETWORK

The Vacant Land Advocacy Network (VLAN) is a coalition of resident advocates who champion solutions to vacant land issues in the Pittsburgh area. With over 100 active members, VLAN aims to harness our collective power to advocate for meaningful change. Through VLAN's workshops, calls to action, and events to speak to policymakers, Grounded will provide members with the skills, knowledge, and opportunities to participate in policy-making and development that shape their neighborhoods and communities.

Grounded believes that residents in hypervacant communities have the best insight on what changes will be most effective in addressing vacant and abandoned properties in their neighborhoods. With Grounded's expertise in urban vacant land reuse and our connections to residents across the city and county, we believe that the Vacant Land Advocacy Network can create catalytic change in the communities that have been most impacted by hypervacancy.

In November we hosted our first VLAN workshop series. Together, residents from across Pittsburgh came to learn, share, and create a narrative to move publicly owned vacant land into community—led reuse. From mapping our communities' assets to deconstructing the "urban blight" narrative, this series showed the power of people-led advocacy in creating meaningful change.
















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
